12	Violence: Physical and verbal assault	Volunteers Supervising CPRE staff Hedge-laying trainer Members of the public	Always stay in visual contact with volunteers Explain there is a zero-tolerance policy of violence towards any members of the group	Call emergency services if necessary	1	2	Low

Felling should be directed away from any electric lines. Where felling within 2 tree lengths the advice of the owner of the		1	3	Low

16	Fatigue	Volunteers Supervising CPRE staff Hedge-laying trainer	Ensure people work together Take regular breaks and ensure beforehand participants are told to bring plenty of water and food	Check in with participants and take extra breaks if necessary	1	2	Low
17	Wildlife Disturbances (nests)	Flora and Fauna at site	All activities for this projects to be completed before the end of March to avoid nesting season (April to August)	N/A	1	2	Low
